Read Aloud Program and Volunteer Hours


Reading aloud to your child each day helps develop both vocabulary and reading fluency, and pays off in the classroom. Please continue to read to your child each evening for 15 minutes and record on the Read Aloud Form – in addition, this counts toward your required volunteer hours (up to 1 hour per week/4 hours per month)!

Stop Homework Headaches

Homework is important for three main reasons: 1) it helps your child reinforce skills learned in the classroom; 2) it helps you understand what skills your child is working on; 3) it helps the teacher understand how your child is progressing with the content. We certainly need to work together to help our students make the most out of homework. Here are a few tips for all grade levels.

- 1. Start homework as early as possible. Rest, recreation, family time, healthy dinners, and sleep are very important also and homework should not negatively impact these evening activities.
- 2. Consider using a timer to help keep your child on a schedule. Pace your child's homework with breaks (15-30 minutes of homework and then a short break).
- 3. Build confidence in your child by working through a few homework examples together and then give your child a chance to work on his/her
- 4. Make sure the environment is set for learning. Make sure that the TV or electronic devices are off or put away. Check the lighting and comfort level of the area. Find a space that is away from smaller siblings or other distractions.
- 5. Praise good work habits.
- 6. Let your child focus by leaving the room and checking on your child every 15 minutes. This allows your child to work independently but also get needed feedback.
- 7. Build a work plan for large projects. Teachers typically provide timelines to complete large assignments. Put the dates on the refrigerator and check them off together as they pass.
- 8. Communicate regularly with your child's teacher. If your child is struggling with a concept, forgot something at school, does not have the needed materials, etc., contact your teacher through the planner or by email so that you can work together to support your child. Finally, remember to read the information coming home from the school so that you are well informed.





Math update - WE NEED YOU!

In preparation for life, for classroom success, and for FCAT readiness, all students should be working on math facts at home – addition, subtraction, multiplication and division (as appropriate by grade level). At this point, all 3rd-5th grade students should know ALL of their math facts from addition through multiplication. How you can help:

- 1. Use flash cards to practice quizzing your child at home. Children are 'fluent' when they can provide the answer without thinking or counting.
- 2. Have your child skip count by 3's (or 4's, 6's, 7's, whatever number he is working on) i.e. 3, 6, 9, 12, 15, 18, 21, 24, 27, 30, 33, 36.
- 3. Have your child work on timed math drills to see if she can improve her time.
- 4. Use the following website for timed math drills in addition, subtraction, multiplication and division (and mixed facts) http://oswego.org/ocsd-web/games/mathmagician/maths1.html
- 5. Practice math facts on the way to school, on the way home, before dinner, before bed.

Peace Pole Dedication

On Tuesday, January 21, our Odyssey Prep students participated in the dedication of our Peace Pole in front of the school. The Peace Pole states "May Peace Prevail on Earth" in 8 languages, celebrating many of the students' cultures who attend OPA. We enjoyed a presentation on Peacemakers and Peace Education from our Odyssey's Founder and Head of Schools, Ms. Constance. The students will be learning about peacemakers in the coming months as a follow-up activity.



Visiting Conductor

On Monday, February 3, Ms. Staci Cleveland, conductor of the Melbourne Municipal Band, came to Odyssey Prep and gave a presentation to our classes. Ms. Cleveland taught the children the difference between a band and an orchestra (hint – the strings), how a conductor reads music, and how to conduct their own music (using a pencil). Ask your child how to conduct a loud, bouncy, happy song!


Montessori Village Green VPK
